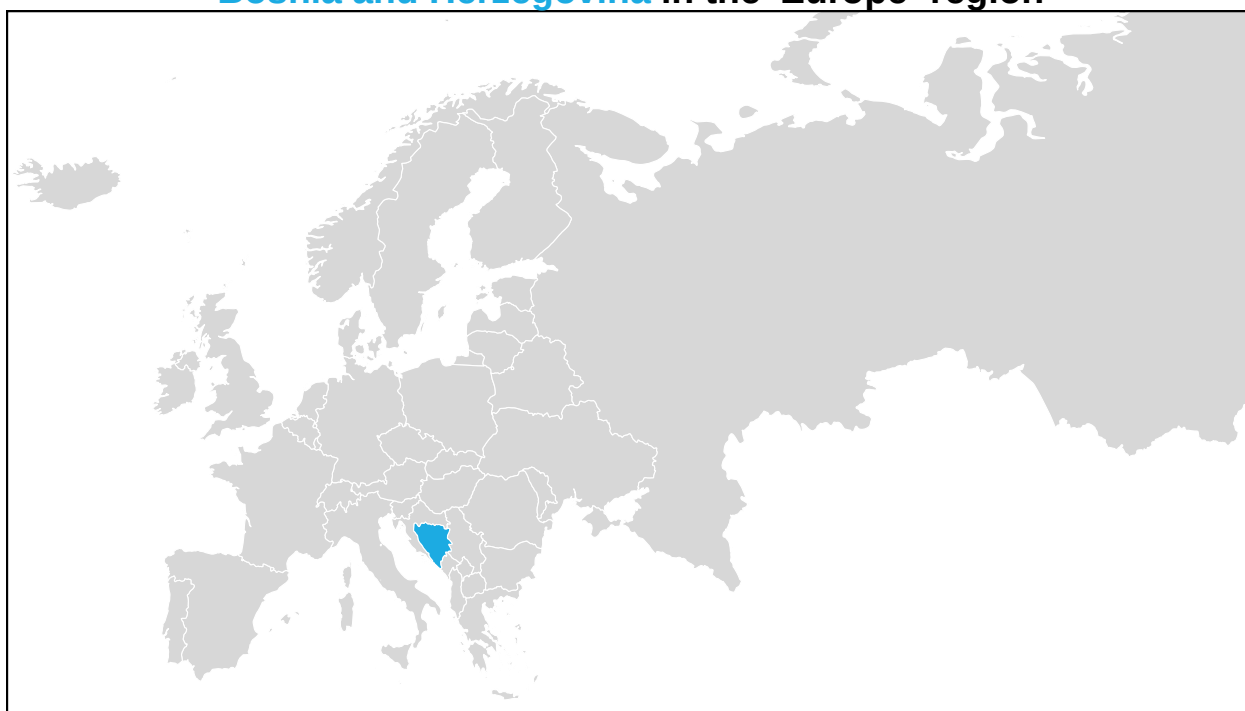

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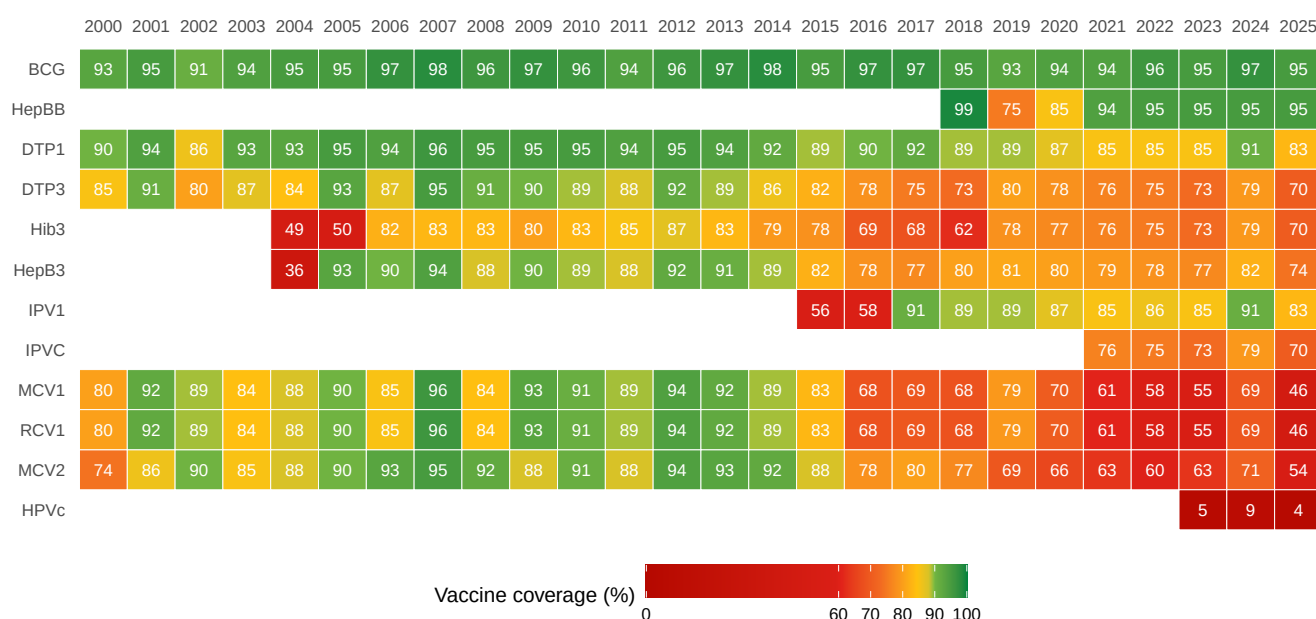
Bosnia and Herzegovina in the 'Europe' region



Overview

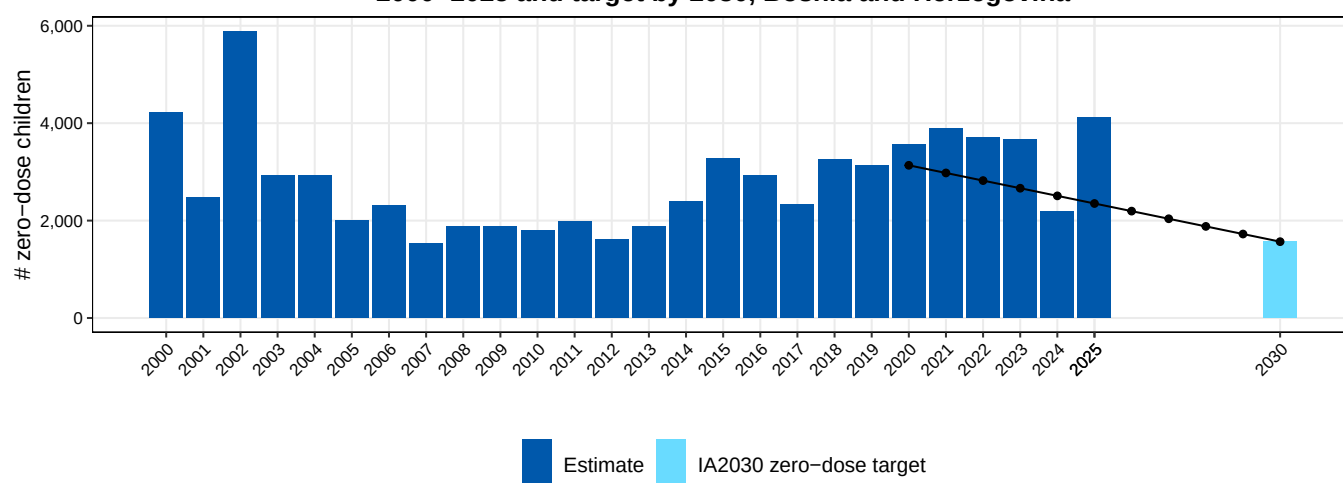
- A total of 11 childhood vaccines are tracked for Bosnia and Herzegovina; of these, 2 reached the 90% coverage target or higher in 2025.
- Coverage of the first dose of diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis-containing vaccine (DTP1) declined from 91% in 2024 to 83% in 2025, coverage of the third dose of DTP-containing vaccine (DTP3) declined from 79% in 2024 to 70% in 2025, and coverage of the first dose of the measles-containing vaccine (MCV1) declined from 69% in 2024 to 46% in 2025.
- In 2025, the number of zero-dose children for DTP in Bosnia and Herzegovina (4,000) was approximately 80% higher than the annual number proposed to achieve the IA2030 target of halving zero-dose children for DTP by 2030 (2,000), based on a linear trajectory of decline.

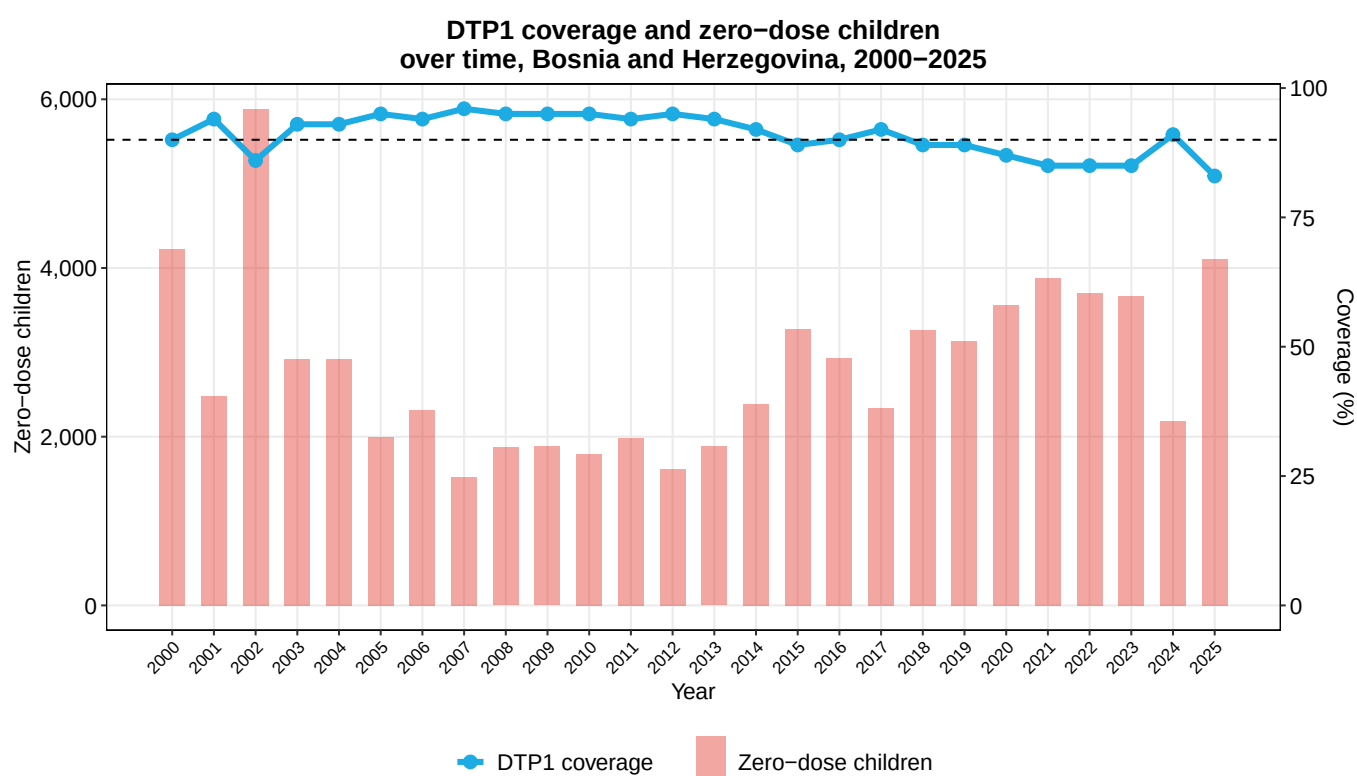
Estimated number of zero-dose children, 2000–2025 and target by 2030, Bosnia and Herzegovina

 Note: The Immunization Agenda 2030 (IA2030) calls on all countries to reduce the number of zero-dose children in 2030 in half by 2030.
 Dark blue bars are the estimated number of zero-dose children in 2000–2025, light blue bar is the target number of zero-dose children by 2030.
 The line and points show the yearly progress and trajectory to meet the target by 2030, based on a linear decline.

DTP1: Reaching zero-dose children

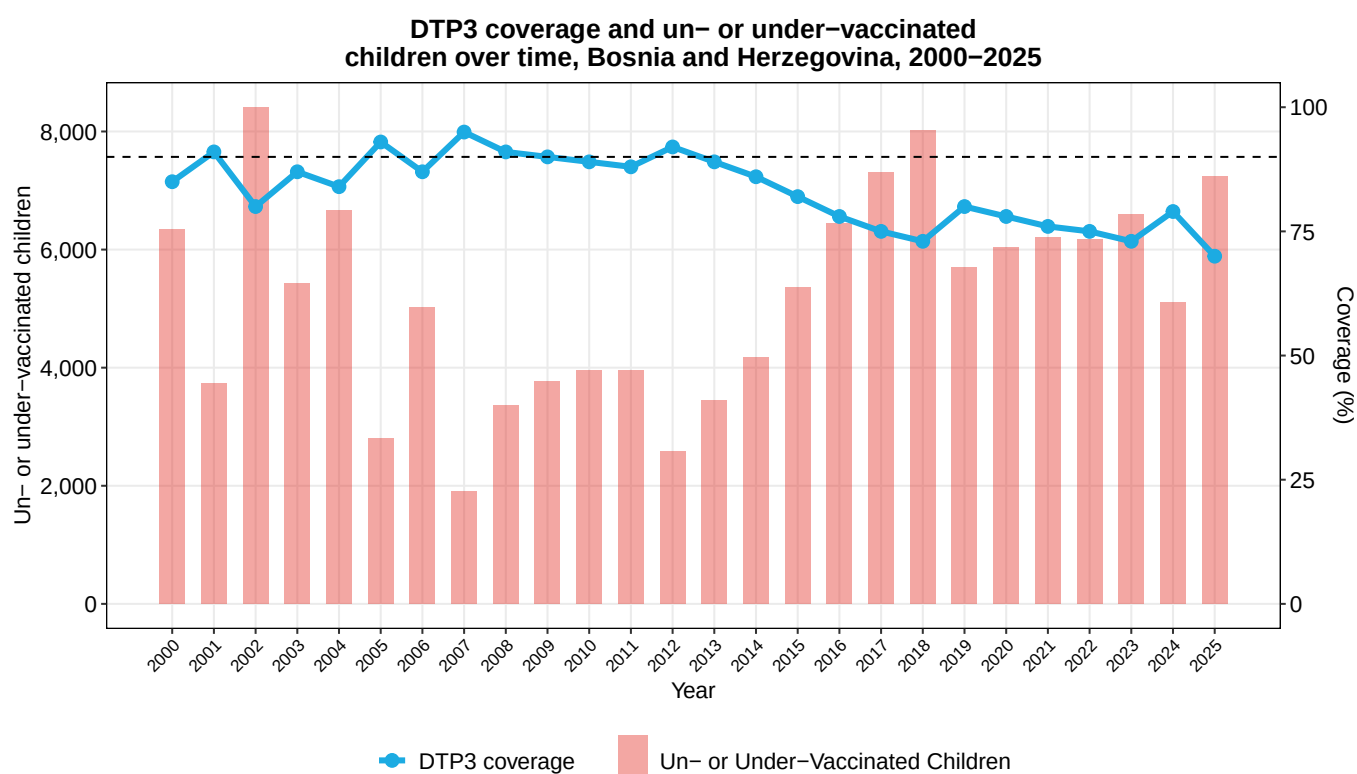
- Coverage of DTP1 stood at 83% in 2025. This is lower than in 2019 (89%) and lower than in 2024 (91%).
- The percentage of zero-dose children was 80 percentage points higher than the IA2030 target in 2025. There were approximately 4,000 zero-dose children in 2025, more than the 3,000 in 2019 and more than the 2,000 in 2024.
- Coverage of DTP1 in Bosnia and Herzegovina (83%) was lower than the Eastern Europe and Central Asia regional average of 90% in 2025.
- DTP1-to-DTP3 dropout in 2025 was 16%, 6 percentage points higher than in 2019 (10%). High DTP dropout rates imply poor ability to provide a complete vaccine series early in life.

DTP3: A marker of routine immunization service delivery to children

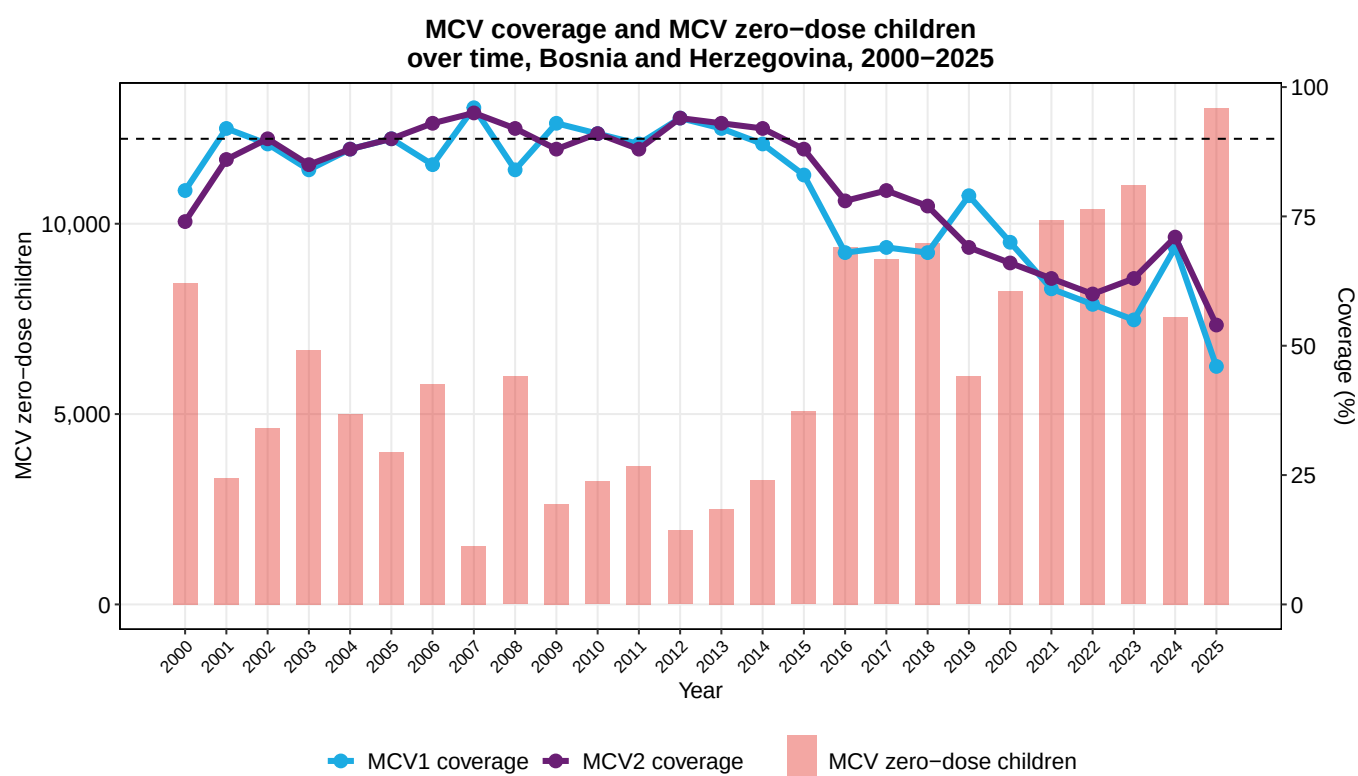
- Coverage of DTP3 stood at 70% in 2025. This is lower than in 2019 (80%) and lower than in 2024 (79%).
- The number of children vaccinated with DTP3 decreased from 23,000 in 2019 to 17,000 in 2025.
- In 2025, there were 7,000 children un- or under-vaccinated in Bosnia and Herzegovina.
- In 2025, 16% of children who received DTP1 did not receive DTP3. This 16% dropout rate was 6 percentage points higher than in 2019 (10%) and 3 percentage points higher than the 2024 dropout rate (13%).
- Coverage of DTP3 in Bosnia and Herzegovina (70%) was lower than the Eastern Europe and Central Asia regional average of 87% in 2025.

MCV: Canary in the coal mine

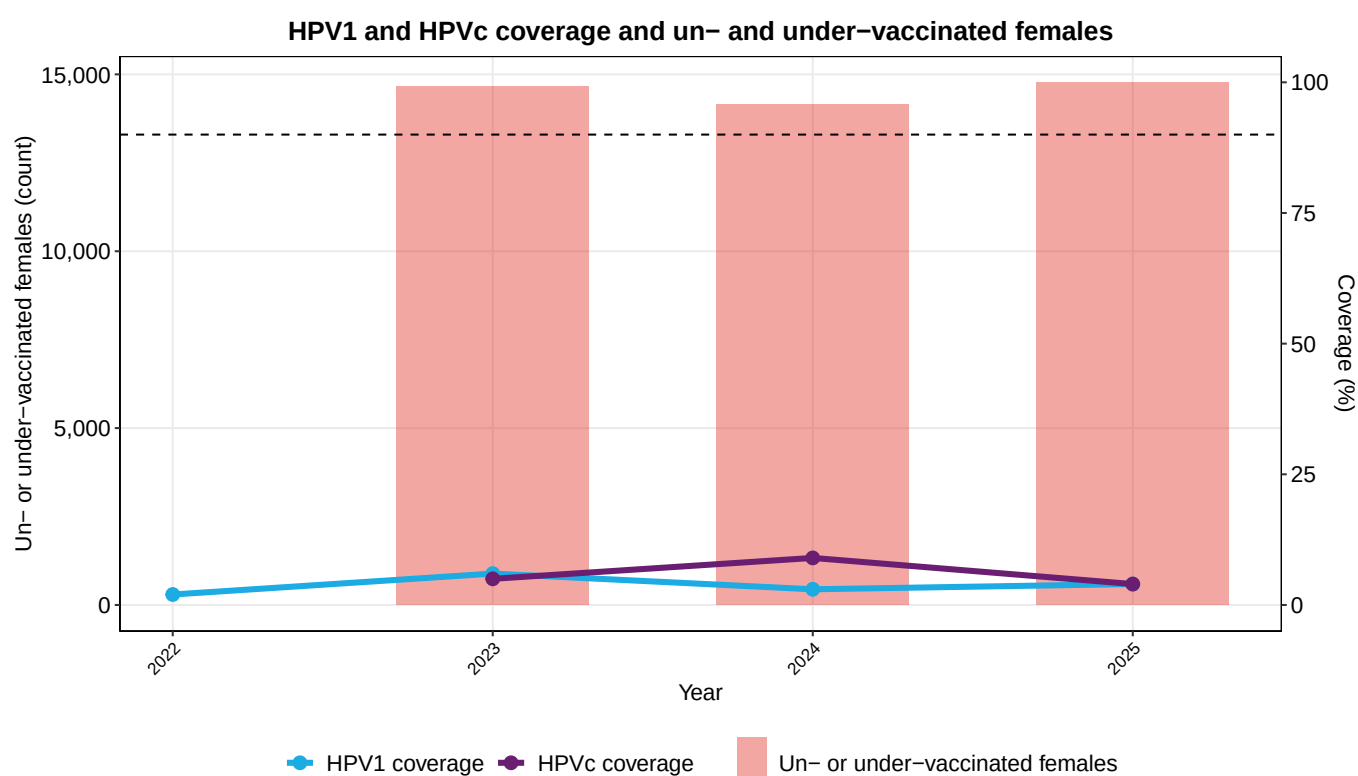
- Coverage of MCV1 stood at 46% in 2025. This is lower than in 2019 (79%) and lower than in 2024 (69%).
- Coverage of the second dose of the measles-containing vaccine (MCV2) decreased from 69% in 2019 to 54% in 2025. This leaves 13,000 children without any protection against measles and another <500 with only partial protection.
- In 2025, 45% of children who received DTP1 did not receive MCV1. This 45% dropout rate was 34 percentage points higher than in 2019 (11%) and 21 percentage points higher than the 2024 dropout rate (24%).
- Bosnia and Herzegovina has had MCV1 coverage below 80% for all of the last 3 years.
- Coverage of MCV1 in Bosnia and Herzegovina (46%) was lower than the Eastern Europe and Central Asia regional average of 88% in 2025.

HPV

- Programme coverage of HPV1 among females increased from 3% to 4% between 2024 and 2025, while coverage of the last dose (HPVc) decreased from 9% to 4%.
- HPVc coverage remains well below the IA2030 target of 90%.
- In 2025, approximately 15,000 females in Bosnia and Herzegovina did not receive any HPV vaccination (unvaccinated).
- Among Eastern Europe and Central Asia region peers, Bosnia and Herzegovina ranked 16 out of 18 countries in HPVc coverage in 2025.



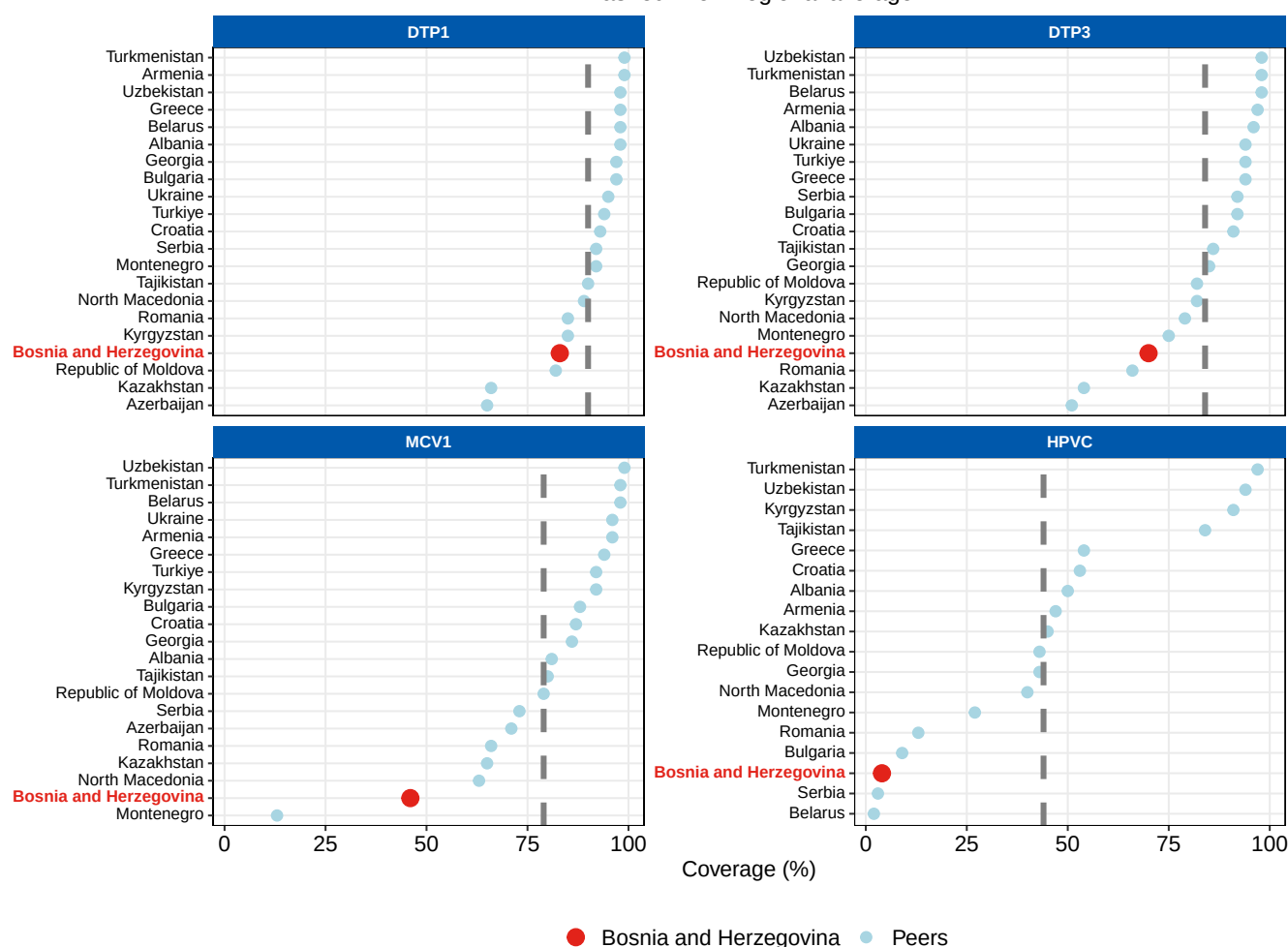

Regional Comparison

The chart below shows how Bosnia and Herzegovina compares to other countries in the Eastern Europe and Central Asia region on DTP1, DTP3, MCV1, and HPVc coverage in 2025. The dashed line represents the regional average for each vaccine.

Coverage comparison: Bosnia and Herzegovina vs. ECAR peers, 2025

Dashed line = regional average

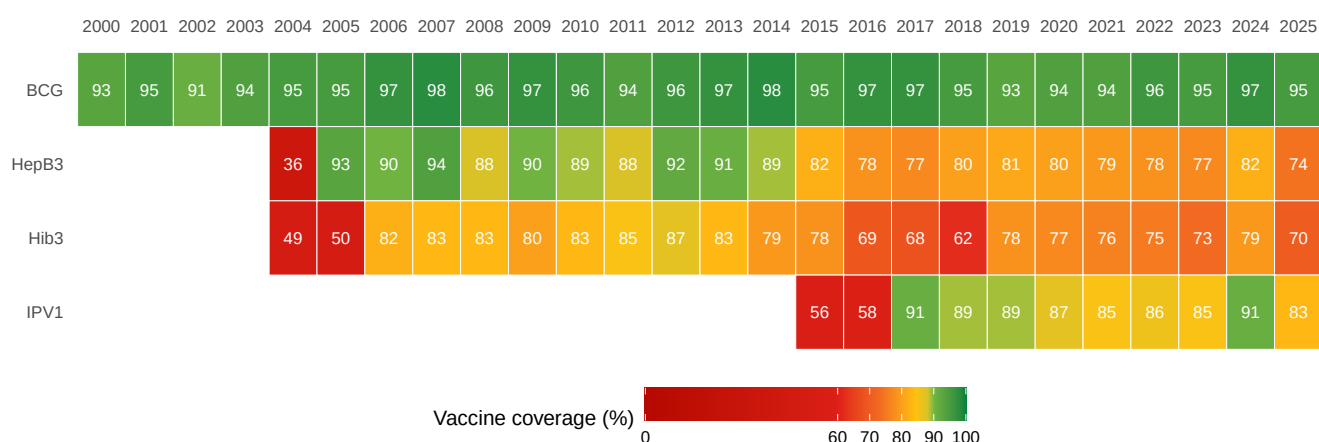

Additional Vaccines

- Coverage of BCG stood at 95% in 2025. This is higher than in 2019 (93%) but lower than in 2024 (97%).
- Coverage of HepB3 stood at 74% in 2025. This is lower than in 2019 (81%) and lower than in 2024 (82%).
- Coverage of Hib3 stood at 70% in 2025. This is lower than in 2019 (78%) and lower than in 2024 (79%).
- Coverage of IPV1 stood at 83% in 2025. This is lower than in 2019 (89%) and lower than in 2024 (91%).

Appendix

WHO/UNICEF Estimates of National Immunization Coverage (WUENIC)

Each year, WHO and UNICEF review national immunization data from Member States, including administrative and official coverage, survey estimates and contextual information, and use rules-based data triangulation approach to assess coverage. Estimates are produced independently, without borrowing data from other countries, and are not based on ad hoc adjustments. In some cases, they rely on a single source, typically nationally reported coverage. When data for a specific country-vaccine-year are unavailable, values from adjacent years are interpolated or extrapolated, and conflicting sources are assessed to determine the most reliable estimate, considering potential biases and expert opinion.

These talking points present the latest WUENIC estimates (published 15 July 2026).

Definitions of immunization terms:

- Bacillus Calmette-Guerin (BCG): vaccine against tuberculosis
- Hepatitis B birth dose, given within 24 hours after birth (HepBB)
- Diphtheria, tetanus, and pertussis vaccine, first dose (DTP1) and third dose (DTP3)
- Hepatitis B vaccine, third dose (HepB3)
- Haemophilus influenzae type B vaccine, third dose (Hib3)
- Inactivated polio vaccine, first dose (IPV1) and last dose (IPVC)
- Measles containing vaccine, first dose (MCV1) and second dose (MCV2)
- Rotavirus vaccine, last dose (RotaC)
- Pneumococcal vaccine, last dose (PCV)
- Yellow Fever vaccine (YFV)
- Meningococcal A vaccine (MengA)
- Human Papillomavirus vaccine, first dose (HPV1) and last dose (HPVc)
